The City of Wewahitchka wastewater plant currently discharges into the Chipola River in the Cockeran area. Even though our plant is an AWT (advanced wastewater treatment) and we currently have very strict discharge limits, and because of the specification of the Apalachicola and Chipola rivers, shell fisheries in the Apalachicola river and the City of Port St. Joe potable water supply is down stream from our WWTP and we are under certain loading conditions at the plant and meeting our levels of treatment to insure that we do not exceed the limits for discharge, we are having to increase the plant and the reject water capacity the City has looked at all funding sources for this project. This project has very strong environmental impact. In addition this project is \$2,115,000. of while \$120,000 would be spent with a local engineering firm with Administration and Engineering.

This project needs to be considered by the Gulf County Restore Act also some of the unincorporated areas pertaining east of the City limits of Wewahitchka are located in a flood prone area. The City of Wewahitchka would like to recommend the Gulf County Board of Commissioners consider septic tank abandonment on all of the areas down and adjacent to Lake Grove Road in the unincorporated areas. As of February 28, 2013 almost all of the septic tanks in this area are covered or will be covered by this weekend, with river flooding waters. The entire overflow from these septic tanks will be going into the Apalachicola and Chipola Rivers or the Apalachicola and Chipola River cut off. The City is proposing an upgrade and already permitted the upgrade for the City WWT facility and we could operate and maintain the wastewater collection system if the county would install it. This project would have a mayor impact on the environmental impact during flood conditions.

The City of Wewahitchka is pleased to provide the quarterly progress report for the quarter **beginning October 1, 2012, and ending December 31, 2012**, for the Wewahitchka Wastewater Treatment Facility (WWTF). This is the twelfth progress report for the Administrative Order which was executed on December 16, 2009. Please recall the meeting held on March 29, 2011, in which the Department required revisions to the current Administrative Order. In addition, a permit modification has been approved by the Department to upgrade the existing 0.2 MGD WWTF to a 0.24 MGD treatment capacity in lieu of construction a new 0.5 MGD facility. The items listed below have been updated in reference to this meeting. Items as outlined in the Consent Order are also included below.

REQUIREMENTS OF THE ADMINISTRATIVE ORDER

A. Demonstrate Compliance with New Limitations for Intermediate Disinfection:

FDEP has determined that the WWTF effluent discharge travel time to a Class II water is less than 24 hours, thereby requiring that F.A.C. Chapter 62-600 rules be met for intermediate disinfection. FDEP has further determined that the indirect potable reuse regulations originally required in the current permit no longer will be required eliminating the high-level disinfection requirement. For intermediate disinfection, a chlorine residual of 1.0 mg/L shall be maintained after 15 minutes contact time at the peak hourly flow of the facility.

Compliance with the intermediate disinfection is currently being met utilizing the existing chlorine basins with no modifications. The compliance date to meet intermediate disinfection began on December 16, 2010. Recent DMRs should reflect compliance with intermediate disinfection.

B. Demonstrate Compliance with Interim Operator Staffing Requirements:

The existing 200,000-gallon holding pond will be modified to a capacity of 720,000 gallons. This allows for three (3) days of effluent storage. Per the F.A.C. Chapter 62-600.510, where the travel time to Class II waters is less than 24 hours, which FDEP has determined applies, storage volume shall be equal to the average daily flow of the WWTF multiplied times the number of full days the operator is not on-site plus another 24-hour period. Therefore, the currently permitted final staffing requirement of a Class C or higher operator 6 hours/day for 7 days/week will no longer be required. Due to the 3-day storage provided, staffing requirements of 6 hours/day, 5 days/week with one weekend visit will apply.

The lead operator at the Wewahitchka facility is Wenman Wade, Class C operator. The day shift operator is Ricky McMillion, Class C operator.

C. Demonstrate Compliance with Discharge Limitations:

The Department recently issued an amendment to the Consent Order OGC File No. 09-0378-23-DW, effective August 10, 2010, extending the interim effluent nitrogen limits until modifications to the WWTP are completed. The DMRs have demonstrated an effluent total nitrogen consistently below the 12.5 mg/L monthly average.

On September 28, 2011 the City received a permit revision to expand the existing 0.2 MGD intermittent cycle extended aeration system (ICEAS) WWTP to a 0.24 MGD ICEAS WWTP. The effluent nitrogen concentration is permitted a 5 mg/L (annual average) for the 0.24 MGD WWTP. The increased WWTP capacity will result in slightly higher effluent loading rates to the Chipola River than the originally designed 0.2 MGD ICEAS facility effluent loading rates. However, when considering the background water quality of the Chipola River upstream of the plant discharge, the proposed effluent loading rates at an increased discharge flow rate of 0.24 MGD will not further impact the Chipola River. Detailed loading calculations are presented in the revised Preliminary Design Report that was submitted to the Department on July 20, 2011.

REQUIREMENTS OF THE CONSENT ORDER-

A. Retain Professional Engineering Services to Perform the Stated Tasks:

As stated in Progress Report No. 1, Preble-Rish, Inc. (PRI) was contracted by the City in December of 2007 to perform the following tasks: determine the cause of non-

compliance through evaluation of the facility, design modifications to the facility that are required for compliance, prepare FDEP applications for modifications, oversee construction of modifications, submit FDEP certificate of construction completion and prepare responses to FDEP requests for additional information.

PRI has completed design modifications to the facility. As previously stated, the City received a permit revision from the Department to increase the capacity of the existing ICEAS plant to 0.24 MGD with a continued discharge to the Chipola River. The currently permitted surface water discharge capacity of 0.33 MGD is requested to remain requiring a flow limitation on the plant to 0.24 MGD. Effluent will continue to be discharged to the Chipola River at a slightly increased loading rate but with no adverse impacts until funding is available to construct a land application system.

B. Pay Consent Order Monetary Settlement or Submit In-Kind Project Proposal:

On August 15, 2009, PRI submitted an In-Kind project proposal for approval by the Department. The City was notified by mail on September 9, 2009, that the proposed In-Kind project did not meet In-Kind project requirements. Therefore, on October 7, 2009, the City sent to FDEP the required monetary settlement.

C. Publish Notice of Consent Order in Newspaper:

A newspaper article providing notification of the issued consent order was published in the News Herald on August 5, 2009. An affidavit of publication was sent to the Department soon thereafter.

STATUS, PROGRESS AND SCHEDULE OF COMPLIANCE

As mentioned in previous progress reports, Preble-Rish was hired to assist the City by providing professional services to complete the stated tasks of the Consent Order. Compliance tasks as outlined in the Consent Order are addressed below.

A. Determine Cause of Non-Compliance Through Evaluation of Facility:

While efforts continue to meet permitted effluent nitrogen concentrations, the City has decided that the appropriate corrective action for the Consent Order, due to financial constraints, is to upgrade the existing ICEAS facility allowing for an increased capacity of 0.24 MGD. The City has successfully reduced the amount of inflow and infiltration in the collection system since the original Preliminary Design Report was written which identified the need for an increased treatment capacity to 0.5 MGD. Additionally, the City has observed a significant decrease in annual growth rates within their service area. The City feels that a 0.24 MGD treatment capacity will adequately meet the City's 20-year needs. New process equipment and plant controls will be included in the modifications to allow for more operational flexibility.

B. Design Modifications to the Facility as Required for Compliance:

PRI has completed design modifications to the facility. As previously stated, the City received a permit revision from the Department to increase the capacity of the existing ICEAS plant to 0.24 MGD with a continued discharge to the Chipola River. The currently permitted surface water discharge capacity of 0.33 MGD is requested to remain requiring a flow limitation on the plant to 0.24 MGD. Effluent will continue to be discharged to the Chipola River at a slightly increased loading rate until funding is available to construct a land application system. Thus, a permitted capacity of 0.33 MGD is proposed for continued surface water discharge with no adverse impact to the Chipola River as previously discussed. The following effluent concentrations limits are permitted for the 0.24 MGD WWTF:

- cBOD₅ Concentration: 10 mg/L, Loading Rate: 20 lbs/day
- TSS Concentration: 10 mg/L, Loading Rate: 20 lbs/day
- TN Concentration: 5 mg/L, Loading Rate: 10 lbs/day
- TP Concentration: 4 mg/L, Loading Rate: 8 lbs/day

Permitted WWTF modifications include the following design components:

- Dual manual bar screens;
- Dual manual grit chambers;
- Magnetic flow meter;
- Equipment replacement and upgrades to the two existing SBR basins;
- Addition of a third SBR basin;
- Alum feed system to aid in phosphorus removal;
- Intermediate disinfection using existing chlorine contact basins and a new chlorine feed system;
- Dechlorination with existing sulfur dioxide gas feed system;
- Modifications to the existing 0.2 MG holding pond to provide 3-days storage at 0.72 MG;
- Equipment replacement and upgrades to the existing aerobic digester; and
- Sludge handling pumps to transfer digested sludge to four existing sludge drying beds.

These modifications will be accompanied by a process guarantee from the process manufacturer to meet the following permitted effluent parameters:

The currently permitted final staffing requirement of a Class C or higher operator 6 hours/day for 7 days/week will no longer be required. Due to the 3-day storage provided, staffing requirements of 6 hours/day, 5 days/week with one weekend visit will apply.

C. Prepare FDEP Applications for Modifications

FDEP issued a final permit on December 16, 2009 for the construction of a 0.495 MGD sequential batch reactor WWTF, a surface water discharge increase from 0.2 MGD to 0.33 MGD and a Part II restricted access land application system of 0.5 MGD. On September 28, 2011 the FDEP issued a permit modification to allow the existing 0.2 MGD intermittent cycle extended aeration system (ICEAS) WWTP to a 0.24 MGD ICEAS WWTP.

D. Oversee Construction of Modifications

Permitting of the existing ICEAS plant to a capacity of 0.24 MGD has been completed. The City submitted revised FDEP State Revolving Fund (SRF) grant and loan applications for funding to construct modifications to the existing WWTP. There are no construction activities to oversee at this time.

E. Submit FDEP Certificate of Construction Completion

This documentation will be prepared and submitted to FDEP upon the completion of modifications to the wastewater treatment facility.

F. Prepare responses to FDEP Request for Additional Information

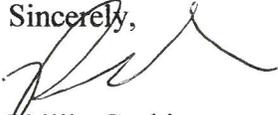
As previously mentioned, all requests for additional information have been formally addressed.
