FEMA, FCC Announce Nationwide Test Of The Emergency Alert System

Similar to local Emergency Alert System Tests, this Test is Scheduled to Take Place on November 9, 2011

WASHINGTON, D.C. -- The U.S. Department of Homeland Security's Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) and the Federal Communications Commission (FCC) will conduct the first nationwide test of the Emergency Alert System (EAS). The nationwide test will occur on Wednesday, November 9 at 2 p.m. eastern standard time and may last up to three and a half minutes.

The EAS is a national alert and warning system established to enable the President of the United States to address the American public during emergencies. NOAA's National Weather Service, governors and state and local emergency authorities also use parts of the system to issue more localized emergency alerts.

Similar to local EAS tests that are already conducted frequently, the nationwide test will involve broadcast radio and television stations, cable television, satellite radio and television services and wireline video service providers across all states and the territories of Puerto Rico, the U.S. Virgin Islands and American Samoa.

On November 9, the public will hear a message indicating that "This is a test." The audio message will be the same for both radio and television. Under the FCC's rules, radio and television broadcasters, cable operators, satellite digital audio radio service providers, direct broadcast satellite service providers and wireline video service providers are required to receive and transmit presidential EAS messages to the public. A national test will help the federal partners and EAS participants determine the reliability of the system and its effectiveness in notifying the public of emergencies and potential dangers nationally and regionally.

"A national test of our Emergency Alert System, with the vital communications support and involvement of participants, is a step towards ensuring that the alert and warning community is prepared to deliver critical information that can help save lives and protect property," said Damon Penn, FEMA's Assistant Administrator of National Continuity Programs. "Because there has never been an activation of the Emergency Alert System on a national level, FEMA views this test as an excellent opportunity to assess the readiness and effectiveness of the current system. It is important to remember that this is not a pass or fail test, but a chance to establish a baseline for making incremental improvements to the Emergency Alert System with ongoing and future testing. It is also important to remember that the Emergency Alert System is one of many tools in our communications toolbox, and we will continue to work on additional channels that can be a lifeline of information for people during an emergency."

"The upcoming national test is critical to ensuring that the EAS works as designed," said Jamie Barnett, Chief of the FCC's Public Safety and Homeland Security Bureau. "As recent disasters here at home and in Japan have reminded us, a reliable and effective emergency alert and warning system

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is key to ensuring the public's safety during times of emergency. We look forward to working with FEMA in preparation for this important test."

Over the past two years and as part of ongoing national preparedness planning efforts, FEMA, the FCC and other federal partners, state, local, tribal and territorial governments, Emergency Alert System participants and other stakeholders have been working toward making this test a reality.

As the federal, state, tribal, territorial and local governments prepare for and test their capabilities, this event serves as a reminder that everyone should establish an emergency preparedness kit and emergency plan for themselves, their families, communities, and businesses. Anyone can visit www.Ready.gov for more information about how to prepare for and stay informed about what to do in the event of an actual emergency.

This report is to inform the Gulf County Commission of the Fire Control and Forest Management activities performed by Florida Forest Service personnel over the past year.

Gulf County was assessed \$21,185.78 for fire protection on 302,654 acres at a rate of \$0.07 per acre. This assessment was deposited into the State of Florida's General Revenue Fund.

The Florida Forest Service provides 9 full time employees and the necessary equipment for the purpose of fire control, emergency management, and landowner assistance. These services are provided at an estimated annual cost of \$371,357.00 to the Florida Forest Service.

Gulf County received \$23,750.00 from grants administered through the Florida Forest Service for the following:

- Stone Mill Creek VFD - \$3,936.00 – Slide in skid unit.
- South Gulf VFD - \$12,814.00 – SCBA apparatus equipment.
- Overstreet VFD - \$7,000.00 – for radios, hose, nozzles, and other firefighting equipment.

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Florida Forest Service fire control units responded to 38 wildfires in Gulf County that burned a total of 1785.4 acres. Lightning was the major cause of wildfire ignition, with incendiary fires being the next leading cause. Gulf County received an average rainfall of 45.98 inches, as compared to last year's average of 73.98 inches.

There were a total of 181 burning permits issued to landowners in the county, authorizing 9,827 acres and 186 piles to be burned.

The Florida Forest Service is currently working on three wildland fuels mitigation projects in the county. We will continue to identify areas where mitigation projects can be accomplished with minimal impacts while protecting the greatest number of resources.

The Florida Forest Service is continuing its Fire Reduction Initiative Program. This program is designed to reduce man-caused fires through educating the public on the lawful ways to conduct outdoor burning.

Florida Forest Service personnel and Smokey Bear appeared in two (2) parades in Gulf County. FFS personnel conducted ten (10) Information and Education Programs for Gulf County public schools and daycare centers. All of these programs were conducted in an effort to teach our younger generation the importance of fire safety and fire prevention.

The Florida Forest Service will continue to support the County's fire departments and Emergency Management Services in obtaining equipment and gear whenever possible through the Federal Excess Program.

COOPERTIVE FORESTRY ASSISTANCE PROJECT

This report of the Gulf County Cooperative Forestry Assistance (CFA) project includes activities and accomplishments for the period 7/1/2010-6/30/2011. Project expenditures during that time period amounted to \$1,000 in county funding and over \$15,000 in state and federal funding.

During the time span of this report, 16 requests were handled by your County Forester. Eleven field visits were preformed for timber management or insect/disease purposes, involving 547 acres. One Gulf County landowner received \$450.00 under the Southern Pine Beetle Prevention Program.

Indirect forestry benefits to landowners and homeowners are provided through various surveys and studies conducted by the Florida Forest Service, the County Forester is designated to facilitate the fieldwork for those projects in Gulf County. Following up on our annual southern pine beetle aerial detection survey, we preformed one ground check but found no active infestations.

One environmental education program for Wewahitchka Elementary School second graders was given at Wetappo Tower, with approximately 85 students attending.

During the year 9 incidental and administrative request were received which resulted in 45 hrs of office and research time.

An online grant application training will be provided by the Office of Criminal Justice Grants (OCJG) staff. An e-mail will be forthcoming regarding this training.

The Project Start and End Dates in the on-line application should reflect the period **February 1, 2012 through June 30, 2012**.

Application completion will require an "Announcement Code" which is a security feature allowing access to the application. The Announcement Code is **JAGD1112**. Note that this Code will be activated on **October 17, 2011**. Application completion will not be possible without the announcement code. Video guides are available for certain tasks and can be accessed from the Help menu in SIMON. The deadline for this on-line submission is **Wednesday, November 23, 2011** at **5:00 p.m.** at which time the announcement code will be deactivated.





Dear Commissioner Yeager:

Lieutenant Governor Carroll and I have recently visited vital military installations located within Florida, including bases identified by our State legislature as being particularly vulnerable to urban encroachment and incompatible future land development. These visits have highlighted the need for cooperation between the military and local governments in order to promote compatible land development which will benefit both the private and public sectors.

The Defense Industry and valued service members are immensely important to Florida. According to the Florida Defense Alliance, Fiscal Year 2008 defense spending was directly or indirectly responsible for \$58.1 billion, or 7.5 percent, of Florida's gross state product. Every county in the State positively benefits from our military installations and all but three counties have at least \$4 million per year in direct defense-related spending. This spending accounted for a total of 686,181 jobs for Floridians. I am proud of our State's partnership with the military and our residents who have made the patriotic choice to serve our State and nation.

As our national leaders contemplate another round of Base Realignments and Closures ("BRAC") for 2015, it is imperative that elected leaders communicate the strategically vital role that military bases hold in protecting both our domestic and foreign security. In that regard, I urge all local governments to form and maintain strong working relationships with base commanders in order to prevent issues such as base encroachment.

Federal law requires federal agencies and state and local governments to develop measures to control the harmful effects of noise on people. In response to this federal mandate, DOD initiated the Air Installations Compatible Use Zones program ("AICUZ") to protect the public's health, safety, and welfare and to prevent encroachment from negatively impacting the operational capability of military air

installations in meeting national security. I encourage local governments to incorporate the AICUZ program into their local land use planning process. I am convinced that by enabling our military installations to develop capabilities in close partnership with local constituents and officials, we will see an increase in economic development in the surrounding communities. With focused, productive dialogue and cooperation at all levels of government, the presence of military installations will serve to benefit the state economy, local economies and personal property interests.

Dynamic leadership is needed to foster mutually acceptable climates and interactions between our installations and our constituents. Your direction will ensure the future viability of our State's important military installations and training capabilities and is critical to not only our State, but to the defense of our nation as well.

I ask for your continued support, in carrying out the vital responsibility of protecting military installations. Our shared goal is to provide a framework for land use planning and the leadership to resolve novel issues amicably and for the benefit of all citizens.

Thank you for choosing The Ferguson Group (TFG) for Gulf County's government affairs services. Per our discussion with you and Chairman Yeager, we are pleased to submit this letter of agreement to provide federal representation and consulting services to Gulf County to advance your federal interests.

With the right strategic guidance and support Gulf County is well-positioned to be effective in obtaining federal assistance on a number of fronts including, but not limited to, Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) reimbursement and to remove land on St. Joseph Peninsula from the Coastal Barrier Resources System (CBRS). We look forward to working with you on these issues, as well as competitive grant opportunities, through the remainder of 2011, while simultaneously working with the County to develop and implement a Federal Agenda and strategy for reaching federal objectives in 2012.

Either party may terminate this agreement at any time with no cause grounds required nor stated by providing the other party at least thirty (30) days prior written notice of such termination at which time the parties shall provide a final reconciliation and invoice for outstanding expenses in addition to final month's consulting services.




